

At the Lodge with Skyler BY: Jody Merrick









What this means...

We know that consistent and familiar relationships and routines are important to Skyler's development and learning. This familiarity contributes to his sense of security and attachment, which is his emotional well-being, positive self-identity, and a sense of belonging. These are a few of the holistic developmental goals described in the Alberta Curriculum Framework for Early Learning that our visits to the Lodge meet:

When Skyler talks about the familiar things he expects to see and do (grapes, birds, piano), participates/initiates singing, plays the piano, shows others around, and interacts with senior residents at the Lodge, he demonstrates/develops his

- growing sense of self in his self-confidence and initiative
- sense of other in caring for others
- sense of other in experiencing trust and compassion with children and adults
- sense of place through becoming familiar with sights, sounds, rhythms, and routines of the Lodge
- sense of place through generating a shared repertoire of narratives and memories

What's next...

Many have noticed that Skyler seems to have an interest in music and singing, particularly the piano. Bringing musical instruments into the playroom as well as making musical instruments can help support him further. Perhaps inviting Skyler to make a shaker of his own.
